## 1) Who we are

Through its collections and services the Wellcome Library provides insight and information to anyone seeking to understand medicine and its role in society, past and present. The Library is freely open to the public. We are one of the world's major resources for the study of medical history and also provide access to a growing collection of contemporary biomedical material.

### **The history of the Library**

The Library is descended from the collections of [Sir Henry Wellcome \(1853-1936\)](#), the pharmaceuticals manufacturer who founded the [Wellcome Trust](#). This independent charity is now the UK's largest non-governmental source of funds for biomedical research.

Sir Henry took a very broad view of what constituted material of medical interest. He saw the history of medicine as part of a wider story of humankind's place in the physical universe; of how people have tried to make sense of their environment and control it. As a result, Sir Henry's collections overlapped into various disciplines beyond the strictly medical.

### **The Library today**

The formats of the materials held in the Library are as varied as their content. Our published holdings cover books dating from the invention of printing right up to the present day. We hold manuscript and archive sources ranging from medieval anatomical texts to the typescript records of twentieth century societies and pressure groups. The Library also possesses a huge amount of illustrative material – paintings, prints, photographs, and so forth – depicting medical personnel, processes, institutions and a miscellany of other topics. A growing number of electronic resources are being made available to registered Library users.

All year round the Library runs free workshops to help you to discover and exploit various library resources. These are all listed on the [Library website](#). We also offer [tours and visits](#).

## 2) Access and contact details

### Who can use the Library?

The Wellcome Library is freely open to the public. Please just bring one form of identification indicating your current home address on your first visit, and allow ten minutes to complete the registration process.

Readers using the Library's Archives and Manuscripts collection for the first time will be required to speak briefly with the Duty Archivist and complete a Reader's Undertaking form.

### 3) Using the catalogues

#### Published material

The Library's book, pamphlet, journal and database holdings are detailed on an [online catalogue](http://catalogue.wellcome.ac.uk/) (<http://catalogue.wellcome.ac.uk/>). For works by a particular author, search the catalogue using the "Author" option. For material about an individual, select "Name/Brand/Title" from the drop-down menu on the left of the screen. Using an individual's name in the "Word" option will bring up works by or about that individual.

Most of the published sources for biographical and family history research are housed in the Library's Quick Reference Collection. A small but growing number are also available electronically. Checklists which summarise some of the most important sources are at the back of this guide.

#### Archives and manuscripts

The Library's archive and manuscript material runs from the Dark Ages to the present, taking in illuminated manuscripts, administrative records, personal correspondence and research notes, and a wide variety of other types of document. The majority of material of use to biographical research dates from before 1900. Twentieth century archive material held at the Library is, with a few significant exceptions, not useful for this type of research.

Most of our unpublished material is detailed on the [archives online catalogue](http://archives.wellcome.ac.uk/) (<http://archives.wellcome.ac.uk/>). It can be searched by name or any other keyword. Printed or typescript catalogues can also be consulted in the Library. The only material not yet described in electronic form comprises a few twentieth century collections.

Downloadable sources guides and handlists on various themes can be found on the [Library website](#). Particularly useful finding aids are the two guides to [Manuscripts relating to London](#) and [Manuscripts relating to specific areas, outside London](#). These gather together information about records of hospitals, general practitioners, chemists, personal diaries and letters.

#### Paintings, prints and drawings

Many of the Library's iconographic holdings are described in the same [online catalogue](#) as the published material. A drop-down menu on the right of the screen allows you to narrow a search to "Pictures" only.

Searching for a name using the "Word" option will generate a list of images by or of that individual. The catalogue can also be searched for the names of hospitals or other institutions at which an individual may have been employed, or places in which they lived or where their tomb is located.

All of the pictures described on the catalogue can be viewed in the Library. Images of them are gradually being digitised and mounted on [Wellcome Images](http://images.wellcome.ac.uk/) (<http://images.wellcome.ac.uk/>). This website also includes images taken from books, journals and pamphlets.

The [Biography Index](#) is a cumulative quarterly index to biographical material in books and magazines (1946 to present) housed on the History of Medicine Collection open shelves at the end of shelfmark BZP. Having found a useful reference, you should then check the [online catalogue](#) to see if it is held in the Wellcome Library.

## Biographies

## Obituaries

The [online catalogue](#) contains references to over 18,000 obituaries. To locate an obituary, choose the "Name/Brand/Title" option from the drop-down menu on the left of the screen. Enter the individual's surname in the search box. To browse all the obituaries, choose the "Genre/Medium" search option and enter the word 'Obituaries'. In most cases the record will simply tell you the journal in which the obituary is located but in a few cases there is a link to the relevant page in an electronic journal.

Obituaries of late eighteenth and early nineteenth century individuals are found in [The Gentleman's Magazine](#). Although the Library does not hold a complete set of the magazine, it holds [The Gentleman's magazine biographical and obituary notices, 1781-1819](#) index volume.

This lists most practising and retired doctors in Britain and its colonies, although it is not compulsory for a doctor to be in it. Entries provide details of addresses, qualifications, places of training, places of work and any publications. The format changes over the years. At some stages the volumes list doctors in a straight alphabetical sequence and at others divides them between London and the Provinces, or even subdividing the Provinces with separate sections for Scotland and Ireland. You should carefully check the contents page to ascertain the arrangement used. Doctors' deaths are usually deducible only from the year that they disappear from the directory but some include an obituary section.

## **8) Veterinary surgeons**

Cash books, recipe books and vets' bills document this area of practice. The most significant group of records is the [Norman Comben Collection](#) of ephemera, containing documentation relating to veterinary practitioners, farriers and agricultural chemists across the United Kingdom from the late eighteenth century to the early twentieth (MSS.7562-7569). [Western Manuscripts handlist no. 29](#) indexes the individuals concerned.

### Hospitals

The [Hospital Records database](http://www.nationalarchives.gov.uk/hospitalrecords/) (<http://www.nationalarchives.gov.uk/hospitalrecords/>) records the whereabouts of surviving public hospital records in the UK. There are currently over 2,800 entries in the database, which is freely available online. Archives classed as public records, such as documentation from NHS hospitals, are usually deposited at their local record office and not the Wellcome Library.

Histories of various individual hospitals, often including information on key individuals, can be found at the History of Medicine Collection shelfmark CAF. You can search this location on the [online catalogue](#) by selecting the "Barnard Class" option from the drop-down menu on the left of the screen.

The Library holds over three thousand printed annual reports of hospitals and asylums. These are described in the [online catalogue](#). To find a specific institution, choose the "Name/Brand/Title" option from the drop-down menu on the left of the screen and search under the institution's name. Alternatively, to browse all reports choose the "Genre/Medium" search option and type in 'Hospital reports' or 'Asylum reports'.

Most of our patient records come chiefly from mental hospitals. Formal case records under one hundred years old are closed under the Data Protection Act. Significant quantities of patient records (and other material listing individuals) are held for the following institutions:

The Library has numerous accounts/recipe books relating to general practitioners and apothecaries that include patients' names. You can check the [archives online catalogue](#) to see if a practitioner is mentioned, but there are too many patients' names for these to be indexed. Use the [archives online catalogue](#) and/or [sources leaflets](#) to see what practitioners' records are held for the appropriate town or area. You then have to come into the Library to check through them, and use whatever indexing is present in the records themselves.
